Trafficking Intervention and Response Program (TRIP)



The Oregon Department of Justice (DOJ) has been successful in (1) mandating all state agencies to complete annual trainings on human trafficking awareness and identification, (2) mandating youthserving agencies to conduct human trafficking screening for all children at intake, (3) creating and implementing a crisis and non-crisis response protocol, and (4) creating and implementing human trafficking training.

OREGON PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Developing response protocols

The Oregon team developed a crisis and non-crisis response protocol for urban, rural, and tribal **communities.** The strength of Oregon's model response protocol hinges on the structure and flexibility it provides for each county or community to tailor their protocol to maximize local strengths and overcome local challenges. Oregon piloted the protocol in multiple counties to obtain local perspective and input on the unique needs of different regions and jurisdictions within the state.

For their Improving Outcomes program, Oregon identified a need to establish a unified awareness and training strategy for the state's anti-trafficking response.

WHAT IS **IMPROVING OUTCOMES?**

The Improving Outcomes for Child and Youth Victims of Human Trafficking grant program supports state and tribal responses for children and youth victims of trafficking. This program is funded by the Office for Victims of Crime at the Department of Justice.

Increasing victim identification

The Oregon team has built capacity to generate ethical, victim-centered, trauma-informed processes, trainings, and tools designed to support effective identification and response to child and youth trafficking. The Improving Outcomes grant created a foundation for a sustainable statewide human trafficking approach. Improving Outcomes grant activities positioned the Oregon DOJ as the lead state agency advancing a statewide antitrafficking agenda. They provided

recommendations to the state legislature, resulting in funded legislative mandates requiring annual human trafficking awareness and identification trainings for all state agencies.
