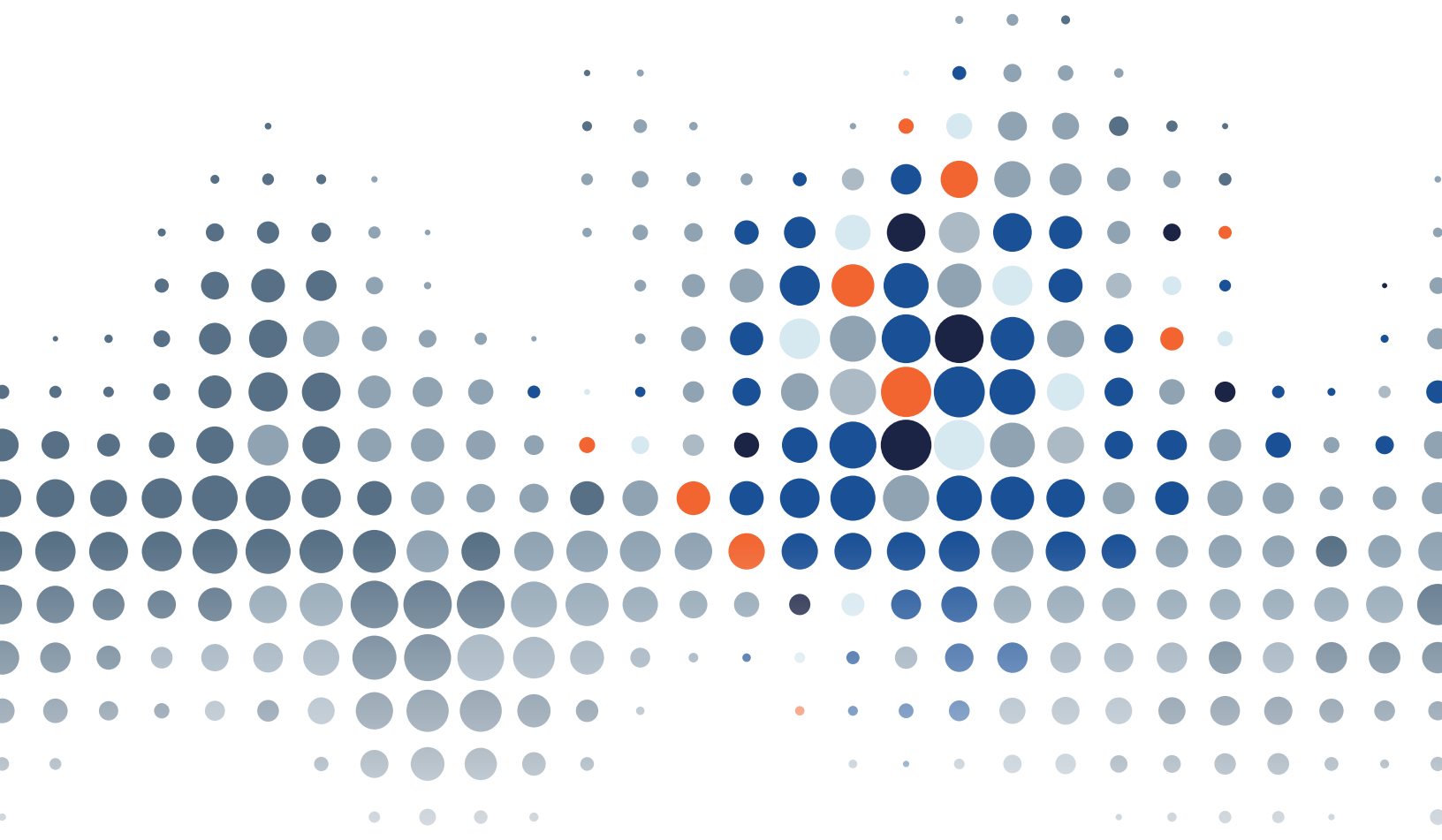

## Introduction and Intent of the Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix

The Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix was designed by RTI International's *Improving Outcomes for Child and Youth Victims of Human Trafficking* (Improving Outcomes) Training and Technical Assistance Program team. The purpose of this matrix is to provide professionals who may encounter victims of human trafficking with a comprehensive list of screening and assessment tools to improve victim identification and service provision. The goal of this document is to help professionals identify tools that best meet the needs of their agencies.

### Methodology and Limitations

Team members reviewed existing peer-reviewed and non-peer-reviewed literature, reports, and practitioner resources to identify human trafficking screening tools to support the process of trafficking victimization identification and response. Upon identifying a screening tool, team members reviewed both the tool and any supplementary resources connected to it to populate the Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix. There are some limitations to this matrix. The team did not evaluate the statements of the tools' designers or test the tools for validity. Additionally, inclusion of these tools in the matrix is not an endorsement of the tools.

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## About the Improving Outcomes Training and Technical Assistance Program

The Improving Outcomes grant program, funded by the Office for Victims of Crime (OVC) since 2016, awards state or Tribal entities to improve the identification of and coordinated response to child and youth victims of human trafficking within their states or territories. Improving Outcomes grantees are developing and implementing diverse jurisdiction-wide strategies to address child and youth trafficking through improved identification, service linkages, and law enforcement response. Although each grantee project is tailored to its state, local, and/or Tribal jurisdiction and context, many states have employed cross-cutting approaches that will likely be useful for others to review, consider, learn from, and build upon in their own states and communities.

## Key Terms and Definitions

Here you will find important words and definitions that will aid in selecting the appropriate tool for your needs.

| Term                    | Definition   |
|-------------------------|--|
| <b>Screening</b>        | Screening is the first step in identifying youth with indicators of trafficking. Screening should be followed by a comprehensive assessment to understand the full scope of a person’s needs and circumstances. For the purposes of this document, identification tools are included under “screening tools.”                  |
| <b>Assessment</b>       | Assessment is a comprehensive evaluation of a person’s strengths, needs, and experiences, which is used to inform treatment or other interventions.  |
| <b>Child</b>            | A child (minor) is a person under the age of 18 years of age.  |
| <b>CSEC<sup>1</sup></b> | Commercial sexual exploitation of children (CSEC) refers to a “range of crimes and activities involving the sexual abuse or exploitation of a child for the financial benefit of any person or in exchange for anything of value (including monetary and non-monetary benefits) given or received by any person.” <sup>2</sup> |
| <b>CSE</b>              | Commercial sexual exploitation (CSE) manifests in numerous forms, such as sex trafficking, prostitution, sex tourism, pornography, early marriage, performance in sexual venues, and online or electronic transmission of children engaged in sexual activities. <sup>3</sup>  |
| <b>Validated</b>        | Validity refers to the extent to which an instrument, screening, or assessment tool measures what it is intended to measure. An instrument is considered “valid” if it measures what it sets out to measure.   |
| <b>Youth</b>            | Youth indicates a person of transitional age between childhood and adulthood, ranging from 16 to 22 years of age. Tools that use the term “youth” should define the specific age range.  |

<sup>1</sup>The U.S. OVC differentiates between “sex trafficking” and “CSEC.” However, we have included tools that use CSEC synonymously with child sex trafficking. Given the different ways that people use this term, we have chosen to include tools that use this term when it is clear they intend to serve victims of child sex trafficking.

## Key Considerations

When using the Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix, it is important to consider several key factors. Ask yourself the following:

### What is the purpose of the tool?

Will it be used to identify victims of human trafficking, or will it be used to assess the individual for the purpose of interventions or services? Will the tool be used to determine eligibility for certain programs and services?

### Who will administer the tool?

Will the entire agency or department use the tool, or will key personnel be responsible for administering it? Does that person have appropriate qualifications and/or training to administer the tool?

### Who will be screened or assessed?

Will screening or assessment be universal (i.e., will every person the agency encounters be screened?) or will the tool be administered to people who meet certain criteria, such as a certain age group, those accessing a certain service, or those participating in a certain program?

### How much time can be dedicated to screening or assessment?

In what setting will the tool be administered? Crisis settings often afford less time to screen. When selecting a tool, consider how and when staff will encounter potential victims and the duration of the encounter.

### How will my agency create a safe environment for victims?

Whether using an assessment or screening instrument, creating a safe and trusting environment is paramount. Conducting an assessment and screening prior to developing the necessary rapport with victims or in an unsafe environment may result in psychological harm to the victim or impact the accuracy of the information gathered.

### How will the tool be implemented?

What policies need to be developed and implemented to reinforce the use of the screening or assessment tool?

### What are the requirements to use this screening or assessment tool?

How will staff be trained on the tool? Some tools require training by the author of the tool prior to use. Please be sure to read and understand all user manuals and guides, training, and implementation requirements outlined by the author of the selected tool to ensure proper administration.

### What processes are in place if a victim becomes distressed during the administration of the tool?

How will staff be trained on trauma-informed care and de-escalation? What plans and protocols will be enacted if someone shows signs of distress? Should a mental health provider or trained professional implement the tool?

## How to Use the Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix

Programs vary with regards to clients served, time for screening, and outcomes sought. These factors impact which tool is the best fit for each program. The Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix identifies 12 headings to consider when identifying the appropriate tool. Take the following steps to select the most effective screening or assessment tool:

### 1 Review the 12 elements of each instrument.

When considering an instrument, review each of the elements and headings carefully. Doing so will help you select the tool that suits the needs of your agency. The following are the elements covered in the tool:

- **Author:** agency or institution that developed the tool
- **Purpose:** assessment or screening
- **Trafficking type:** labor trafficking, sex trafficking, or both
- **Administered by/agency type:** the institute/professional group for whom the tool is intended
- **Time:** the length of time it takes to administer the tool
- **Age group:** the age group the tool is intended or validated for
- **Outcome:** what happens based on the screening
- **Administer qualifications:** specific practitioner or training requirements to administer the tool
- **Administration instructions:** specific guidance on how to administer the tool
- **Validated:** the tool's proven ability to measure what it is intended to measure
- **Contact information:** how to contact the people who designed the tool
- **Additional comments:** relevant information not included in other headings

### 2 Develop a training and implementation plan.

After selecting a screening or assessment instrument, work with key leadership and team members to develop a policy outlining how the tool will be administered. Ensuring staff training on the tool and understanding of the policy will ensure proper administration.

### 3 Evaluate results.

Regularly reviewing findings will allow you to improve agency activities and policies and troubleshoot any gaps in training, policies, and service delivery.

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## Other Screening and Assessment Tools

The Human Trafficking Screening Tool Matrix includes a tab that includes other instruments and publications that have been referenced in the literature. Although RTI International was unable to locate these instruments or key details about them, these tools have been included for users to explore.
